Rochelle Becker, Executive Director, Alliance for Nuclear Responsibility



Rochelle Becker has been active on nuclear safety issues in California for 28 years. As the past Mothers for Peace spokesperson and project director, Rochelle testified before the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC), the Nuclear Regulatory Commission, the California Energy Commission, the Regional Water Quality Control Board, the state legislature and Congress.

Rochelle was instrumental in gaining the support of California's Attorney General and the County of San Luis Obispo for a federal appeal. It was filed in December 2003 addressing the Nuclear Regulatory Commission's refusal to allow hearings on post 9/11/01 security before licensing an expanded high-level radioactive waste facility on

California's vulnerable earthquake active coast.

She has also worked with organizations on safety issues at the San Onofre Nuclear Generating Station (SONGS). She is currently working with California Earthcorps in legal proceedings to address the safety concerns of replacing steam generators at the Southern California nuclear plant before the CPUC.

Rochelle has been quoted in articles and published Op Ed's in local, state and nationwide newspapers. She is often interviewed by many radio outlets including NPR's California Report, KPFA, KPFK. Rochelle was recently interviewed by David Brancaccio on nuclear security post 9/11/01, on the PBS program NOW. Producer Peter Meryash lauded Ms. Becker's interview "You were such a good voice of reason and I know viewers really responded well to your thoughtful and non-wonky insights".

Rochelle is the first member of the public from California to be invited to speak as a panelist at the Nuclear Regulatory Commission's annual conference in March 2005.

Rochelle has won several environmental awards and for several years was the President of the Board of the Environmental Center of San Luis Obispo. Rochelle's non-environmental community activism includes: founding the birthday program for homeless children at the Santa Barbara County's after school program in Santa Maria, working on Child Abuse issues in Santa Barbara and San Luis Obispo County, serving as president of the Camp Fire Board and Executive Director of the March of Dimes in Santa Maria.

Rochelle is a graduate of the University of San Francisco.



SUMMARY REPORT FROM A CA DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION DELEGATE

Six of our members were delegates to the State Democratic Convention: Derek Casady, Nancy Casady, Michael McQuarry, Lawrence Zynda, Gerry Senda, and Carolyn Shadle.

There were multiple ways to experience the California Democratic Convention. This is one person's report.

Celebration

The first was the celebration. We continually cheered the fact that the Democratic party had swept every statewide office.

Government Leaders

The second was to hear from all of the State Constitutional officers and other government leaders. We heard informative and passionate speeches from such leaders as:

Dave Jones, CA Insurance Commissioner (and his daughter who did a wonderful presentation of the Star Spangled Banner) - advocating the passage of AB52 to give him authority to reject insurance rate increases

Gavin Newsom, CA Lieutenant Governor - promised a jobs plan in 100 days.

John Chiang, Ca State Controller - leading corporate governance reform

Kamala Harris, CA Attorney General - "It's time for Democrats to go on the offensive and say what we want."

Debbie Wasserman Schultz, incoming chair of the Democratic Party.

John Perez, Speaker of the CA Assembly - looking for two votes in order to enact Revenue Recovery.

Betty Yee, Board of Equalization- lamenting the tax deductions for the rich.

One wondered, as they talked, which one might be poised to be the NEXT governor!

House Minority Leader **Nancy Pelosi** spoke via video and exhorted the Democrats to take back Congress and protect middle class values, health care for seniors and education for our youth. She said, "....We will continue fighting to make it 'Made in America' to create good paying jobs. And we will always protect the collective bargaining rights of our unions."

U.S. Senator Dianne Feinstein was the speaker at Saturday's lunch. She, too, urged the Democrats to work to retake the House of Representatives next year or risk deep GOP budget cuts that would hurt seniors and poor people the most.

Unfortunately, Governor Brown was not able to appear because he was undergoing minor surgery to remove a cancerous growth from his nose.

Robert Reich, former Secretary of Labor and professor at UC Berkeley, spoke at dinner. He said, the only way America can reduce the long-term budget deficit, maintain vital services, protect Social Security and Medicare, invest more in education and infrastructure, and not raise taxes on the working middle class is by raising taxes on the super rich.

U.S. Senator Bernie Sanders (Independent from Vermont) was the keynote speaker. He said, we have closed 50,000 factories in the last 20 years; 400 families at the top have incomes totaling 150 million citizens at the bottom. After two wars, a prescription plan, Wall St. bail out, tax cuts, we have a \$14 trillion debt. It's time to tax the wealthy.

Workshops

I attended one on **Redistricting**. A panel discussed the process which is now in the hands of independent citizens. Now is the time to make the commissioners aware of voices in your community. The map will be drawn by July 28 and submitted to the Department of Justice.

Caucuses

Caucuses met to provide exchange among the delegates around many important issues: African-American, Arab-American, Asian Pacific Islander, Business & Professional, Chicano Latino, Children's, Computer and Internet, Disabilities, Environmental, Filipino American, Irish American, Labor, LGBT, Native American, Progressive, Rural, Senior, Veteran's, Women's.

Committees

There was important business carried on by the various committees - Affirmative Action, Credentials, Finance, Legislation, Organizational Development, Platform, Resolutions, Rules, Voter Services.

The **resolutions committee** (of which Michael McQuarry is a member) reviewed over 80 resolutions presented by the clubs and districts and then presented a package for approval by the delegates. Included were resolutions to support workers and their rights to collective bargaining, to oppose cuts to Planned Parenthood, in support of the state's right to collect sales tax in online purchases, healthy oceans, the California Dream Act, and a resolution condemning Orange County Republican central committee leader Marilyn Davenport for circulating a cartoon depicting the president as a chimpanzee and urging the GOP to remove her from her post.

Economic Justice Action Group
